

October Meeting Notice

The Ellington Historical Society will meet on Thursday, October 27, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. at the Hall Memorial Library at 93 Main Street. After a brief business meeting, Culver Modisette of Stafford, president of the Northern Connecticut Land Trust, will present a program about his just released historical novel, *Honored Enemy*. He will be speaking about the Native American tribes and the U.S. Cavalry in the Great Southwest in the late 1800s, as well as his research methods. The program is free, and the public is invited. New members are always welcome. Bakers for the meeting will be Connie Nichols and Bev Nichols.



“This historical novel adheres to the history of the Great Southwest in the late 1800s, a past shared by the Comanche, Kiowa and Cheyenne tribes, as well as their adversaries, the United States Cavalry. Colonel Ranald Mackenzie’s Fourth Cavalry was pitted against Comanche war chief, Quanah Parker, and his Indian allies in a struggle for dominance in Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma, as the whites recklessly squandered the vast buffalo herds.

Written after extensive research, the book sheds light on little-known events of the era, culminating in Parker’s friendship with President Theodore Roosevelt. As the saying goes, ‘Truth is stranger than fiction.’ Liberally illustrated by historic photographs, the book appeals to readers for enjoyment, as well as those who seek little-known history of the Southwest. The plight of the tribes, the loss of their mainstay food source, the buffalo, and the usurpation of their lands, will give pause to all Americans young and old.”—amazon.com

News from the Archivist-Lynn Kloter Fahy

In my 2009 book, *Crystal Lake, Tolland County*, there is a photograph of a house which was built on a hill to the west of the lake in 1832 by Warren Richardson, who married Luna Dimock. I read in her son Merrick’s autobiography, *Looking Back*, that Luna earned money to furnish the house by braiding palm leaf hats for the slaves of Southern planters. This summer, in the Nellie McKnight Museum, I found a hand-written reference to sacks of palm leaves being shipped to Ellington, and further research revealed that many New England housewives earned extra money by braiding palm leaf hats.
