

There is no rain date for our event. Spaces are 10' x 20' for a donation of \$20 for non-members and \$15 for members. This donation is nonrefundable. News from the Archivist—Lynn Kloter Fahy

Items from the estate of Homer and Kay Peckham were donated recently to the Nellie McKnight Museum by Jaime Peckham. Included was this 1854 photograph of the house that contained classrooms and a gymnasium for the Edward Hall Family School for Boys. The building is now a private home next to the large apartment building on the corner of Main Street and Berr Avenue that used to house the Hall family and boarding students.



Another recent donation is a snapfish photo album about Moser Farms, donated by Joan and Roger Moser. It is a photographic history of the farm from the 19th to the 21st century. It

provides valuable documentation of the important part that the Moser family played in the history of Ellington's agricultural and industrial history.

Many thanks to Carolyn Blouin of the Vernon Historical Society, who found a scrapbook created by Emily McKnight Davis, Nellie's sister, among the donations to their upcoming book sale. She rescued it and it is now back in Ellington. Emily started the scrapbook in 1935, when Connecticut was celebrating its Tercentenary. It contains photographs and newspaper and magazine clippings. Shirley Hayden has offered to scan the scrapbook for long-term preservation. Both the Moser book and the scrapbook will be on display at the April meeting.
